FDOT Completes State Road (SR) 25/NW 36 Street Roadway Project

From NW 5 Avenue to North Miami Avenue

MIAMI, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has completed the roadway improvements along SR 25/NW 36 Street from NW 5 Avenue to North Miami Avenue. The five-month project began in July 2020 and cost an estimated \$630,688. General Asphalt, Inc. was the contractor. FDOT completed this work with the support of elected officials and the community.

The following scope of work was performed on this project: restricting the left turn movement along westbound SR 25/NW 36 Street at the intersections of NW 3 and NW 1 Avenue; restricting the left turn movement along southbound NW 3 and NW 1 Avenue to eastbound SR 25/NW36 Street; upgrading pedestrian signals and repaving crosswalks at the intersections of NW 5 and NW 2 Avenue; installing a new traffic signal at North Miami Avenue; and repaving and restriping the roadway.
