Full Northbound I-95 Closure at I-395 Tonight

MIAMI, Fla. – All northbound I-95 lanes will be closed on Thursday early morning, October 29, between the hours of 1 a.m. and 5 a.m. to repair an overhead electronic message board. The northbound I-95 ramps to westbound State Road (SR) 836 and eastbound I-395 will remain open during this time. During this closure, drivers on northbound I-95 who want to continue going north can:

- Access the eastbound I-395 ramp, then exit at NE 2 Avenue/Biscayne Boulevard (Exit 2B)
- Turn right at NE 2 Avenue, then turn right at NE 11 Street
- Turn right at NE 1 Avenue, then access the ramp to I-95 to continue north

Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unforeseen conditions. The closures are part of the I-395/SR 836/I-95 Design-Build Project that will reconstruct the I-395 corridor from the SR 836/I-395/I-95 (Midtown) Interchange to the MacArthur Causeway Bridge, including the construction of a Signature Bridge over NE 2 Avenue and Biscayne Boulevard; double-deck SR 836 from west of NW 17 Avenue to the Midtown Interchange and the replacement of the concrete pavement on I-95 from NW 8 Street to NW 29 Street.
