Continuous Closure of Northbound I-95 Ramp to I-195 East/Miami Beach (Exit 4A)

MIAMI, Fla. – The northbound I-95 ramp to I-195 East/Miami Beach (Exit 4A) will be closed continuously from 9 a.m., Tuesday, July 13, until 5 p.m., Friday, July 16. The ramp closure will be repeated during the following periods:

- 9 a.m. on Monday, July 19 continuously closed through 5 p.m. on Friday, July 23
- 9 a.m. on Monday, July 26 continuously closed through 5 p.m. on Friday, July 30

Drivers can continue north on I-95 to access the I-195 East/Miami Beach ramp (Exit 4B) located north of NW 32 Street. The closures will allow the contractor to install new traffic railing.

Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unforeseen conditions.

The work is part of the I-395/SR 836/I-95 Design-Build Project that will reconstruct the I-395 corridor from the SR 836/I-395/I-95 (Midtown) Interchange to the MacArthur Causeway Bridge, including the construction of a Signature Bridge over NE 2 Avenue and Biscayne Boulevard; double-deck SR 836 from west of NW 17 Avenue to the Midtown Interchange and the replacement of the concrete pavement on I-95 from NW 8 Street to NW 29 Street.
