Nighttime Closures on Hialeah Gardens Blvd Begin December 15

Between NW 138 Street and West 84 Street/Graham Dairy Road

MIAMI, Fla. – On Tuesday, December 15 and Wednesday, December 16, 2020, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) will perform temporary nighttime full closures along Hialeah Gardens Blvd between NW 138 Street and West 84 Street/Graham Dairy Road, between the hours 8 p.m. and 8 a.m., for the removal of the old traffic signal mast arms.

Four mast arms will be removed at the intersection of West 84 Street/Graham Dairy Road and one will be removed at the northbound I-75 entrance ramp, utilizing a temporary full closure at each location.

The City of Hialeah Police Department will assist with directing traffic through the area. Drivers should anticipate delays and seek alternate routes if possible. Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.
