### **State Road (SR) 5/US 1/Overseas Highway Lane Closure April 18 through 22**

*Along Sea Oats Beach, between Mile Marker (MM) 74.498 and MM 74.561*

**MIAMI, Fla.** – Beginning Sunday, April 18 through Thursday, April 22, one of two lanes will be closed on SR 5/US 1/Overseas Highway between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m. for pavement reconstruction along Sea Oats Beach in Monroe County. One lane will be open to traffic at all times. Traffic from one direction will be stopped to allow traffic from the opposite direction to pass.

To perform this work safely, flaggers will direct traffic and drivers will be required to proceed at a reduced speed through the construction zone. This work is part of the SR 5/US 1/Overseas Highway Hurricane Irma Embankment Washout Project.

Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.
