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## FDOT District Six to Host Public Hearing for the Five-Year Tentative Work Program

Projects programmed to improve transportation infrastructure in Miami-Dade and Monroe counties over the next five years will be highlighted at this Hearing. The meeting will be held both in-person and virtually on Tuesday, November 15, 2022, at 6 p.m.
