State Road (SR) 886/Port Boulevard over the Intracoastal Waterway Project Begins Week of June 27, 2022

MIAMI, Fla. –The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is scheduled to begin a bridge rehabilitation project the week of June 27, 2022. The project limits extend along SR 886/Port Boulevard over the Intracoastal Waterway. This project will cost an estimated \$2.8 million and will take about 14 months to complete.

The scope of work includes repairing concrete elements, replacing the bridge expansion joints and restoring the existing sidewalk.

Construction will be done in stages with temporary lane closures scheduled to avoid special community events and peak periods of traffic. Nonpeak hours are 6 p.m. to 5 a.m., Monday through Friday. Temporary sidewalk detours will be in place when necessary. Access to and from Port Miami and adjacent neighborhoods and businesses will be maintained during construction.

Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.
