State Road (SR) 9336/SW 392 Street Roadway Project Begins November 27

From Everglades National Park to SR 5/US 1

MIAMI, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is scheduled to begin a roadway project the week of November 27, 2023. The project limits extend along SR 9336/SW 392 Street from Everglades National Park to SR 5/US 1. This project will cost an estimated \$15.2 million and will take about fifteen months to complete.

The scope of work includes: repaving and restriping the roadway; widening roadway and shoulders; installing new drainage structures; replacing expansion joints on bridges (3 bridges); repairing damaged sidewalks; installing a new 12-foot shared-used path between NW 13 Avenue and NW 8 Avenue; upgrading existing bus stops; retrofitting light poles with LED bulbs between NW 6 Avenue and NW 3 Avenue; and installing solar powered speed feedback signs.

To build this project safely, it will be necessary to close travel lanes, sidewalks, and to establish detours at times. Work will be done in stages to minimize construction-related impacts. Drivers might experience delays traveling through the area and should seek alternative routes if possible. Please use caution when traveling through construction zones.

Please follow all posted signage and note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.
