State Road (SR) 913/Rickenbacker Causeway Full Northbound and Southbound Ramp Closure Begins March 1

MIAMI, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) will close the westbound ramp from SR 913/Rickenbacker Causeway to northbound I-95 and southbound SR 5/US 1 daily from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m., from Tuesday, March 1 through Friday, March 4, 2022, for routine maintenance.

During this closure traffic will be detoured as follows:

Drivers who want to go north on I-95:

- Continue westbound on Rickenbacker Causeway
- Stay on left lane
- Westbound Rickenbacker Causeway becomes SE 26 Road
- Follow signs to northbound I-95

Drivers who want to go south on SR 5/US 1:

- Continue westbound on Rickenbacker Causeway
- Stay in left lane
- Turn south on S. Miami Avenue
- Merge onto southbound SR 5/US 1

Drivers should anticipate delays traveling through this area and seek alternate routes if possible.

Please note this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.
