Partial Closure of Northbound I-95 Off-Ramp to NW 2 Street (Exit 2B) Rescheduled for December 13

MIAMI, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has rescheduled the partial closure of the northbound I-95 off-ramp to NW 2 Street (Exit 2B) as part of the nighttime paving operation along northbound SR 925/NW 3 Avenue between the off-ramp and NW 8 Street. The operation is now scheduled for Sunday, December 13 through Sunday, December 20, between the hours of 9 p.m. and 5:30 a.m.

During the paving operation, at least one lane along northbound SR 925/NW 3 Avenue between the off-ramp and NW 8 Street will remain open at all times. Florida Highway Patrol will assist with directing traffic through the area. Drivers should anticipate delays and seek alternate routes if possible.

Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.
