NW 46 Street Rail Crossing Closure from November 17 to November 22

MIAMI, Fla. – The South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA), in coordination with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), will close NW 46 Street from SE 9 Court to NW 37 Avenue starting at 6 a.m. Friday, November 17, through 5 a.m. Wednesday, November 22.

This detour allows workers to rehabilitate the railroad crossing. During this closure, all traffic will be detoured away from the crossing and directed to follow signs to alternate local streets. Traffic will be detoured as follows:

Westbound Detour:

- Turn right on NW 36 Avenue
- Turn left on NW 54 Street
- Turn left on SE 10 Avenue
- Turn right on SE 5 Street
- Turn left on SE 9 Court to get back to NW 46 Street

Eastbound alternative Detour:

- Turn left on SE 9 Court
- Turn right on SE 5 Street
- Turn Left on SE 10 Avenue
- Turn right on NW 54 Street
- Turn right on NW 36 Avenue to get back to NW 46 Street

Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.
