Full Closure of NW 35 Avenue for Railroad Crossing Reconstruction, May 18 to May 22

MIAMI, Fla. – The South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) in coordination with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), will close NW 35 Avenue from NW 58 Street to NW 60 Street starting at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 18, through 4 a.m. Wednesday, May 22, weather permitting.

This detour is being established to allow workers to rehabilitate the railroad crossing. During this closure, all traffic will be detoured away from the crossing and directed to follow signs to alternate local streets. Traffic will be detoured as follows:

Southbound Detour:

- Turn right on NW 60 Street
- Turn left on NW 37 Avenue
- Turn left on NW 55 Street to go back to NW 35 Avenue

Northbound Detour:

- Turn left on NW 58 Street
- Turn right on NW 37 Avenue
- Turn right on NW 60 Street to go back to NW 35 Avenue

Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unforeseen conditions.
