NW 58 Street Rail Crossing Closure, January 26 to January 31

MIAMI, Fla. – The South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) in coordination with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), will close NW 58 Street from NW 37 Avenue to NW 35 Avenue starting at 7 p.m. on Friday, January 26, through 4 a.m. on Wednesday, January 31, weather permitting. This closure allows workers to rehabilitate the railroad crossing. During this closure, all traffic will be detoured away from the crossing and directed to follow signs to alternate local streets. Traffic will be detoured as follows:

Westbound Detour:

- Use NW 55 Street
- Turn right on NW 37 Avenue to get back to NW 58 Street

Eastbound Detour

- Use NW 55 Street
- Turn left on NW 35 Avenue to get back to NW 58 Street

Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unforeseen conditions.
