State Road (SR) 25/US 27/Okeechobee Road/NW 36 Street Lighting Project Begins August 23 *From West 18 Avenue to NE 2 Avenue*

MIAMI, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is scheduled to begin a lighting project the week of August 23, 2021 along SR 25/US 27/Okeechobee Road/NW 36 Street from West 18 Avenue to NE 2 Avenue. The project will cost an estimated \$282,289.

The work will last roughly five months and it includes the following: upgrading existing light poles at selected intersections throughout project limits, and installing new light poles at selected intersections throughout project limits.

To build this project safely, it will be necessary to close travel lanes, sidewalks and establish detours at times. Work will be done in stages to minimize construction related impacts.

Please use caution when traveling through construction zones and follow all posted signage. Drivers should anticipate delays and seek alternate routes if possible. Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.
