State Road (SR) 847/NW 47 Avenue Landscape Project Begins March 23

From NW 183 Street to Premier Parkway

MIAMI, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is scheduled to begin a landscape project the week of March 23, 2022, along SR 847/NW 47 Avenue from NW 183 Street to Premier Parkway in Miami-Dade and Broward Counties. The project will cost an estimated \$499,403 and is anticipated to be completed by summer 2024.

The scope of work includes: installing trees, palms, and landscape within the new median. The installation of trees is expected to take several months before the project moves into the establishment phase.

To build this project safely, it will be necessary to close travel lanes from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., on weekdays and weekends. Work will be done in stages to minimize construction-related impacts. Please use caution when traveling through construction zones.
