State Road (SR) 916/NW 135 Street Pedestrian Mast Arm Installation To Occur July 28

Between Cairo Lane and Sesame Street

MIAMI, Fla. – On Thursday, July 28, 2022, a section of eastbound and westbound SR 916/NW 135 Street will be temporarily closed from Cairo Lane to Sesame Street, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3:30 p.m., to install a new mid-block pedestrian traffic signal mast arm west of Alexandria Drive.

The installation of this new mast arm will last approximately 5 to 10 minutes. For safety purposes, the contractor will be utilizing a flagman during this operation. Drivers might experience delays traveling through the area and should seek alternate routes if possible.

Please use caution when traveling through construction zones and note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.

This work is part of the ongoing FDOT safety project along SR 916/NW 135 Street from Cairo Lane to Sesame Street.
