State Road (SR) 924/NW 119 Street Landscape Project Begins November 24

From I-95 to SR 909/West Dixie Highway

MIAMI, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) will begin a landscape project the week of November 24, 2020. The project limits extend along SR 924/NW 119 Street from I-95 to SR 909/West Dixie Highway, and will cost an estimated \$144,698.

The work will last roughly two years and it includes the following: Installing approximately 2,000 small plants and 82 Solitaire Palm Trees along the median within the project limits.

To build this project safely, it will be necessary to close travel lanes from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. weekdays and weekends. Work will be done in stages to minimize construction related impacts in order to avoid special community events and peak traffic hours. Please use caution when traveling through construction zones.
