SR 994/Quail Roost Drive/SW 186 Street/SW 200 Street from west of SW 127 Avenue to SR 5/US 1/S. Dixie Highway Project Begins September 13

MIAMI, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is scheduled to begin a roadway and lighting project the week of September 13, 2021. The project limits extend along SR 994/Quail Roost Drive/SW 186 Street/SW 200 Street, from west of SW 127 Avenue to SR 5/US 1/S. Dixie Highway. The project will cost an estimated \$4.1 million.

The work will last about one year, and includes the following: improving signalization at intersections; improving storm water drainage; repaving of the roadway; upgrading signs and pavement markings; installing new speed feedback signs; relocating the fence at Quail Roost Park; reconstructing pedestrian ramps and sidewalks; replacing bridge railing over the canal, installing plastic poles in the median along Quail Roost Drive between SR 5/US1 and the busway and adding raised median islands at some locations between SW 194 Terrace and 190 Terrace. The project also includes upgrading existing light poles and adding new ones with Light Emitting Diode (LED) fixtures at some signalized intersections.

To build this project safely, it will be necessary to close travel lanes at times. Work will be done in stages to minimize construction related impacts to avoid special community events and peak traffic hours. Please use caution when traveling through construction zones.
