State Road (SR) 989/Allapattah Road/SW 112 Avenue Lane Closures Begin February 14

From south of SR 5/US 1/S Dixie Highway to SW 211 Street

MIAMI, Fla. – Beginning Monday, February 14 through Thursday, February 25, 2022, travel lanes along SR 989/Allapattah Road/SW 112 Avenue from SR 5/US 1/S Dixie Highway to south of SW 211 Street will be closed in both directions Monday through Thursday, between the hours of 9 p.m. and 5:30 a.m., for roadway paving.

The work is expected to last for about two weeks and will include the following detours: northbound traffic on Allapattah Road/SW 112 Avenue will be detoured west on SW 216 Street, north onto S. Dixie Highway and east on SW 211 Street to continue northbound on Allapattah Road; southbound traffic on Allapattah Road/SW 112 Avenue will be detoured east on SW 216 Street, south on S. Dixie Highway and west on SW 211 Street to continue southbound on Allapattah Road. Drivers should anticipate delays traveling through this area and seek alternate routes if possible. Please use caution when traveling through construction zones.

Please follow all posted signage and note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.

This work is part of the ongoing roadway and lighting project along SR 989/Allapattah Road/SW 112 Avenue from south of SR 5/US 1/S Dixie Highway to SW 248 Street.
