Southbound I-95 Ramp to Westbound State Road (SR) 836 to close January 11 for Traffic Shift

MIAMI, Fla. – The ramp from Southbound I-95 to Westbound SR 836 will be closed from 10 p.m., Tuesday, January 11 until 5:30 a.m. Wednesday, January 12, while workers prepare for a traffic shift on this ramp. During this closure, traffic will be detoured as follows:

- Drivers going south on I-95 who want to go west on SR 836 can:
 - Continue south on I-95
 - Exit at SW 7 Street/Brickell Avenue (Exit 1B), then turn left at SW 8 Street
 - Enter the northbound I-95 ramp, then access the ramp to westbound SR 836

When the ramp reopens on Wednesday morning, traffic will be shifted to the right side of the roadway to allow the contractor to perform project related work on the ramp. The new traffic pattern shall remain in place for approximately two months.

Please note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unforeseen conditions.

The work is part of the I-395/SR 836/I-95 Design-Build Project that will reconstruct the I-395 corridor from the SR 836/I-395/I-95 (Midtown) Interchange to the MacArthur Causeway Bridge, including the construction of a Signature Bridge over NE 2 Avenue and Biscayne Boulevard; double-deck SR 836 from west of NW 17 Avenue to the Midtown Interchange and the replacement of the concrete pavement on I-95 from NW 8 Street to NW 29 Street.
